Earth Rising, Inc. Intern Program

The Earth Rising, Inc. board has decided to implement a program that is designed to encourage active participation in the running of Camp Gaea.

The Earth Rising, Inc. board is committed to providing a clear and concise list of expectations which will allow a person who is interested in the intern program to understand what is expected of them, and how they might have the opportunity to become a voting member.

Being part of the intern program is not a guarantee of board membership, however, any future board member will be expected to have been an intern for a period not less then 6 months, or to have previously served on the Earth Rising, Inc. Board of Directors for a term not less then 6 months.

An intern should be willing to commit themselves to:

- **Be a self starter.** Take on a project and stay with it. Identify areas that need help and develop a plan to improve it. Either create a project, or work with the board to identify what needs to be done
- **Attend all meetings.** While exceptions will occur, an intern needs to make ERI meetings a priority. Being part of the decision making process is one of the primary responsibilities associated with being a board member.
- **Be the example and not the exception**. Setting an example is one of the most effective ways to communicate with people who are camping at Gaea.
- **Show good faith** in resolving personal issues that might arise during the normal course of board business.
- **Take the time** to connect with other board members and stay abreast of the issues at hand. It will be the responsibility of an intern to stay in the loop.
- **Show** that consideration of the overall well being of the camp is your first concern when new policies are being debated. Working with Earth Rising, Inc. is not the same as being an advocate for a special event or one of the Exclusive Rental groups.
- Exhibit objectivity when making decisions.

This outline is designed to assist an intern in their efforts to work with the board. It is not meant to discourage people from becoming involved if they aren't willing to donate as much time as would be required for an intern; rather it is meant to help a person understand the level of commitment that is required to sit on the board of Earth Rising.

After a period of 6 months as an intern, that individual may apply for a position on the board if an opening exists or they may continue on as an intern and apply when an opening becomes available if they so choose.



"Just when you think you know something, you have to look at it in a different way."

This is my favorite line from one of my favorite movies, "Dead Poets Society." In the scene, the character played by Robin Williams invites his students to stand on his desk to look at the classroom from a different perspective, in order to gain a new understanding and experience of the same physical space.

My name is Aaron Smith. I am a contemporary artist and my work is about finding ways of seeing the world differently. I exhibit work in museums and select galleries and exhibition spaces throughout the United States. I recently finished my Master of Fine Arts degree and will enter my

second year teaching art and photography at the University of Colorado this fall. Suffice it to say, art is my life.

That is why I am bursting with excitement over a new project that I will be doing at Camp Gaea over the next *year and a day*, and the best part is that the results will be shared with everyone who wants a copy.

I will be using a process known as solarography, to capture one single image of the sun, as it appears to create rings around the Earth, over the course of "A Year and a Day" (which serves as the current working title for the project).



As you can see from the example, this process captures the sun as it, quite literally, streaks across the sky each day. And, as the Earth tilts between the seasons, the Sun rises and falls in the sky, creating beautiful rings. I encourage you to do a Google search (especially an image search) at your earliest convenience. The resulting images consist of an often "ghostly" silhouette of the landscape, but highlighted by brilliant flashing lines throughout the sky.

For this project, I handmade 13 pinhole cameras. These are made from 35mm film canisters, Altoid tins, spice boxes and tea tins. There are no moving or electrical parts.

I have fitted these objects with a small piece of aluminum with a tiny hole drilled into it. By tiny, I mean less than 0.1mm. Opposite the hole is a small piece of photo paper. This is the same light sensitive paper that has been used in dark rooms for decades. Normally, this paper would go through a series of 'baths' in order to develop and fix them.

However, this process requires no development, since the images are removed from the object and scanned into a computer. I am proud to say that this is a zero footprint project and can be installed and removed with no impact to the land or ecology.

I first stepped into Gaea in 1999. I have proudly been a member of the local communities that have supported this special place for 15 years, even from Colorado. The land has always been sacred to me, as I know it has been for so many others. I am genuinely excited to be able to use my skills and talents to show people what "A Year and

a Day" actually looks like, from the one place most of us consider "home."

Thank you, very much, to ERI, Clint Koetting, HSA and everyone involved in supporting this project. It is with special intent that this *year* and a day begin on Thursday, May 21, the opening ceremonies of Heartland Pagan Festival.

It is my wish that, in the coming year, we locate ourselves as much in the moment as in the place; and may all of you find happiness in the streaks of light ahead.

Rules for Pets at Camp:

- 1) All dogs MUST be on a leash, AND under your control. This means the leash is in your hand.
 - A. Although you believe your animal will never harm someone, you cannot predict every situation.
 - B. You don't know how another animal, or another person, may react to your animal running up to them.
 - C. Dogs are NOT allowed in the Dining Hall or Bath House.
 - D. You MUST clean up after your dog when it makes messes (i.e. poop).
- 2) Do NOT feed any animals that you do not own. This refers to wild, stray and domestic animals.
 - A. Feeding the wild animals encourages them to come into people's camps and steal food; this is dangerous as this can also provoke a wild animal to attack.
 - B. Feeding strays encourages them to come back to camp, and to enter people's camps and steal food. We do not want to encourage strays to stay on the land.
 - C. Feeding domestic animals that you don't own may cause problems with that animal. You do not know if that animal may have a food issue, or is food aggressive.
